



Asthma Data



Multiple sources of data are used to provide a comprehensive picture of the burden of asthma

- Population-Based Surveys
 - Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS)
 - Florida Youth Tobacco Survey (FYTS)
 - Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS)
- Mandatory Reported Health Information
 - Emergency Department (ED) and Hospital Discharge Data
 - Transition from ICD-9 to ICD-10, effective October 1, 2015
 - Asthma code now J45 (previously 493)
 - Chronic obstructive asthma removed from J45
 - Florida Vital Statistics Mortality Data


















Age-specific ED Visit Rates per 10,000 Population, 2017








Age-specific Hospitalization Rates per 10,000 Population, 2017








- ASK about tobacco use
- ADVISE that the best thing to do for their health is to quit
 - REFER to Tobacco Free Florida




Cessation Services Help Success



Goal

Reduce asthma morbidity.

Long Term Objectives

Strengthen the collective capacity in Florida to lessen the burden of asthma and improve the quality of life for Floridians living with asthma, increase the provision and quality of comprehensive asthma control services, and reduce disparities in asthma care and health outcomes.

Intermediate Objectives:

Objective 1: Increase <u>schools</u> recognized from 16 (2015) to 30 by 2019.

Objective 2: Increase health plans recognized from 0 (2015) to 5 by 2019

Objective 3: Increase hospitals recognized from 0 (2015) to 3 by 2019

Objective 4: Increase primary care providers recognized from 0 (2015) to 10 by 2019




